Hello BCJHS Band Families,

I hope you are all doing well right now. Band has definitely had to look different this year due to restrictions on playing that require us to be innovative in our approach to teaching music. You may have heard elements of this from your students.

We've had to adopt a schedule of playing outside vs. doing work inside at a safe distance, as well as get a custom made mask and instrument cover for each wind player. In one of our classes, several students, who are supposed to be in 2nd period advanced band, ended up in 1st period intermediate due to scheduling conflicts. There have been many hurdles that we have had to jump through this year, and I anticipate that there could always be more. I want to let you know that I am committed to giving the best possible education to each of these students within the restrictions that we all have to operate under.

I want to let you know of the different resources available to your students. Much of our work is accessible in Canvas, and we are using several different online resources to help supplement things. This is in case we must switch to a hybrid or an online only model of instruction, so that students will still know where to go to complete assignments and stay informed and connected. Here are the resources we have been using:

Smartmusic: - This resources is extremely helpful! It is accessible online, has a huge library of music for students to access and play <u>for FREE</u> and I can assign selections for students to play and pass-off. It also can give the students an example of what the selection is supposed to sound like, give them a metronome, and listen to them play it and let them know what notes they got right, which ones they got wrong, and whether they were on time or not. It can make practicing more engaging and productive for students. If you have a reliable internet connection, your student should absolutely be using this at home to practice their instrument. Please consider asking them to show you how it works! You can also contact me for information about how to best support your student.


Soundtrap: - This online resources is a lot like Garage Band, but is accessible on student's chrome books. It is an engaging way for students to create their own music and become familiar with the world of music technology. We have used it to create several projects, including a ringtone, a soundscape, and a basic pre-built loop project. **Ask your student to show you!**

Noteflight: - This resource allows students to write music out in an online, streamlined experience. We haven't used it too much yet, but we do plan to in the future. Stay tuned for this one!

Below are some band supplies that are crucial to helping your student be successful and organized when it comes to band. Please make sure you have the following:

Brass (Trumpet, Trombone, Baritone)	Saxophone/Clarinet	Flute	Percussion

In addition to those supplies, it is also super important to have a space/time for students to practice. In a lot of ways, practicing is the homework of Band. Think of it like working out or lifting weights. If students struggle with playing something in class (lifting a certain amount of weight), and they don't work on it at home (do less reps, or more reps with a lighter weight), when we move to something harder (heavier), they're suddenly behind! Having a spot where they can practice with minimal disturbance is so helpful!



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




News from the STEM Lab









BCJHS BiomedicalBy Mr. Roush, Biomedical Teacher

This one of the best hands-on lessons of the Medical Detectives class. The students were also challenged later to solve a medical mystery on the location of a possible tumor in another sheep brain based upon the case file they were given. Each group was successful in finding and diagnosing correctly their patient's medical issue.









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Automation & Robotics

Students were programming VEX robots to navigate a course by programming motors to run in certain ways to make the robot turn or go a certain direction. In the project, "road trip", students are building a robot to go from their house to the movie theater, which has a few turns along the way, and then return home. In the second part of this project, they will use the same robot, but it will need to follow a line that is placed on the carpet using line trackers that are coded to make adjustments to get from start to finish.
