Remote students are required by the state to participate as well. More information will be sent out after spring break regarding the testing format for our remote students. Results of the ILEARN will be particularly valuable this year in helping identity learning gaps perpetuated by the pandemic. Part 3 of Cellphones, Tweens, and Teens

Last month we uncovered some interesting facts related to the development of some of our children's most influential technological media: smartphones, social media, and video games. As promised, this month we will explore how using this technology may be influencing our young people.

Doing a quick search on Google for "Smartphones and teens' will return literally hundreds of studies. It's interesting to note that not all of these are current, apparently this is something that has been on the minds of professionals for at least the past decade. However, the underlying theme of this research is showing that depression, anxiety, eating disorders and suicide are just a portion of the mental health concerns linked to excessive "screen time" among our teens and tweens.

According to a 2016 study conducted by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, of 17,000 kids surveyed approximately 13% had a major depressive episode, compared to 8% of the kids surveyed in 2010. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention data shows that suicide deaths among people age 10 to 19 have also risen sharply. One study found that kids who spent three hours or more a day on smartphones or other electronic devices were 34% more likely to suffer at least one suicide-related outcome—including feeling hopeless or seriously considering suicide—than kids who used devices two hours a day or less. (Time, Oct 10, 2017)

One thing that really stood out to me regarding the above referenced study was the importance of the amount of time spent on a device. The amount of time our kids are on their phones is something we have control over! Another article published by ABC in 2018 found that a parent's own cell phone use has direct influence over their child's learning. Obviously we all know that our kids are likely to mirror our amount of usage, but our cell phone use in their presence can actually decrease their ability to learn! Not only that, but researchers at the University of Texas found merely having a smartphone nearby reduces a person's brain power. In a study of 800 cellphone users, researchers found those with their phones in another room did better on tests than those with their phones on their desks.

Although the fear of our teens on cell phones is not something to be ignored we are learning that there are some facets of this danger that we can still control for our children! Next month we will dive more deeply into the effects of this technology and begin to explore the limits that need to be set for everyone's safety.



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
Science
