#### Part 2 of Cellphones, Tweens, and Teens

Are cell phones becoming our prisons or are social media sites just harmless ways to pass the time? Are all of the negative consequences we are starting to see from phone use by our young people really unintentional or are our children being manipulated for the profit of big business? There is now evidence that seems to point to the fact that the consequences we are experiencing may have been planned from the beginning.

The campus of Stanford University in Palo Alto, California, is home to The Persuasive Technology Laboratory. This lab was created by Psychologist, Dr. B. J. Fogg who claims to be the father of this discipline. Persuasive Technology (also called persuasive design) was created solely to configure digital machines and apps to alter human thoughts and behaviors. This includes: smartphones, social media, and video games. The lab boasts of making, "Machines designed to change humans." The founder of Instagram is one of Dr. Fogg's former students. Just let that soak in for a minute! You can read more about Dr. Fogg and Persuasive Technology in the article, The Tech Industry's War on Kids.

If you are reading this newsletter on your phone right now, you are among good company. According to a 2019 study put together by Apple's screen time tracking system, Hoosiers spend an average of 220 minutes per day on their phones. This is an average of 26 hours a week! That adds up to over one month a year – on our phones! A few minutes here or there doesn't seem like a lot, but it quickly adds up. How about the time it takes to just pick it up and check if anyone's texted or called? The average American picks up their phone once every 12 minutes, or 80 times a day.

These are all interesting statistics, but what does it all mean, really? What are the consequences of all of this screen time? How does it differ between adults with fully developed brains and our young people who are still growing and developing? Next month I'll dive into more of what the research says about the effects of cell phone use over time. In the meantime, we need to remember that from our oldest to our youngest children, we are their role models for moderation in life. I think my phone will come off of my desk and go into my purse.


### **STEM Lab**

Students in STEM Lab recently completed a project building Squirrel Feeders. Students watched a video by Mark Rober, a former NASA engineer, who built a squirrel obstacle course in his backyard with lots of booby traps for the unwary squirrels. Students based their feeders off that concept, with some students engineering multiple traps. The goal was to make the poor squirrels really work for their nuts. They made ladders, string bridges, collapsing platforms, nearly impossible jumps, and trap doors.

Students have also been building marble launchers. They launched marbles at varying angles, measured distance, took averages, and then launched for a target based on their calculations. It was great fun! The students were asked to review their data and develop graphs to display the results. The marbles were launched down the Social Studies hallway, and we can happily report that Social Studies teachers were harmed!










### **Students Study the Ancient World**



They are translating a passage into English and then using Cuneiform to write a song or poem into clay tablets.
